Job

**WHO IS IN CONTROL OF EVERYTHING?
GOD IS IN CONTROL OF EVERYTHING IN HEAVEN AND ON EARTH.

Job was a good man who worshiped God. One day, God's enemy, Satan, came to God. God said, "Have you seen Job? He is a good man who loves Me and turns away from evil."

Satan said, "Job only worships You because You have blessed him! If You take away all You have given him, he won't worship You anymore." God gave Satan permission to cause suffering in Job's life. Job lost everything in one day. Job was very sad, but he still worshiped God.
